launch in the Diocese of Port Elizabeth, South Africa RENEWAfrica: Gathered as God's People, a process for founding and supporting SCCs in Africa.

The RENEWAfrica and Gathered as God's People logos were created by young artists of the Port Elizabeth Deanery. Father Albert Nolan, OP, a South African theologian, graciously allowed his

material to be used for *Meet Christ Today*, the first of the five segment series.

It is a vital ministry in today's church, and a great privilege for me.

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Cluny Sisters in Tanzania Responding to urgent Needs in Health Care and Religious Education

A bout a hundred years ago, French Cluny sisters first went to the island of Zanzibar in East Africa to care for the lepers. After many years of ministry at Walezo, they left. It was a long time before another group of Cluny Sisters could be sent to that area. On New Year's Eve 1998, three English-speaking sisters, Sisters Philomena D'Souza, Esther Bambi Waku and Anne Faure arrived in Tanzania. Not only did they reestablish a Cluny missionary presence in a republic created by the unification of Zanzibar and Tanganyika, they were from India, Democratic Republic of the Congo, and Seychelles respectively, forming one Cluny community. In every way, their arrival highlighted the amazing way in which Blessed Anne Marie ever calls and connects us.

The sisters went to Tanzania in response to the late Archbishop Mario Mgulunde's appeal for Cluny sisters to run a parish dispensary in the remote village of Mwanzugi in the Archdiocese of Tabora. The sisters and their ministry at the new dispensary were very welcome.

Today, the dispensary has greatly expanded. It is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The sisters have a lay staff to help them provide treatment and services in several different departments including in-patient care, maternity and free maternal and child health care. The sisters also provide a program for the empowerment of women teaching


them skills so they can become independent. In addition, the sisters are engaged in such pastoral work as visiting the sick and elderly, and teaching catechism to children in and out of schools.

Sister Aline Nicette recently wrote that Tanzania, which is poor in so many ways, seems to be very rich in religious vocations. Soon after the first three sisters started their work in Mwanzugi, a number of young women began showing signs of being attracted

to their way of life. Then the sisters began getting letters from girls who wanted to join the Congregation.

The sisters decided to open a second community, where they could welcome young Tanzanian women who desired to follow in the footsteps of Blessed Anne Marie Javouhey. The late Archbishop Mgulunde graciously loaned them a house in Tabora town which would serve their purpose. This 'Come and See' community was inaugurated on February 11, 2003 under the patronage of Blessed Anne Marie Javouhey. In February 2007 the sisters had the

Sister Christina Matthias, profess vows in the Congregation. Since they do not have a formation house in Tanzania, Sister Christina made her formation in West Africa. Two Tanzanian aspirants will follow Sister Christiana's path in 2009.

Someday the sisters in Tanzania hope to be able to build their own formation house. The current Archbishop, the Most Reverend Paul Ruzoka, has offered them some land. They do not have enough money to build yet, so for now, having a formation house in Tanzania, where there is great hope for Cluny vocations, is still a dream to be realized.

would stop by and visit and pray with us. They helped start the healing process and supported our family."

"My SCC is the place where I grow in faith and in my prayer life. We support one another in living out the faith."

RENEWAfrica begins with a parish mission. Janet told us: "On the second night, we had an anointing service. I prayed that God would heal me from this emptiness I've always felt. As the priest prayed over me and anointed me, I knew I was healed. I am so filled with joy, I want to tell my story to everyone."

At the diocesan Launch of *RENEWAfrica* in the Port Elizabeth Deanery, close to 3,000 people from all ethnic backgrounds joined

together for the celebration of Eucharist with Bishop Michael Coleman and the priests of the area. Each parish presented a bowl of soil to the bishop who mixed it all together at the beginning of the celebration. Before being dismissed, each parish received a lighted RENEWAfrica candle from Fr. Jerry Browne, Director of the Diocesan Pastoral Development Office, and a bowl of the mixed soil, a symbol of unity, from the bishop.

Parish Launches followed on the next Sunday. All 70+ parishes of the diocese now have SCCs meeting regularly and are committed to SCCs as a way of being church: creating a communion of small communities in the local parish.
