# Cluny Students from New Zealand Reach out to Samoan Children

Manuia Le Aso from Tauranga to you all.

On October 5, I left Tauranga with Teresa Rush, one of our teachers and a Cluny Associate, 27 students and 30 parents from our St. Mary School. We were welcomed to Taumeasina Island in Samoa with the blowing of cone shells, beating of drums and garlanding of tropical flowers.

We experienced the culture and traditions of Samoa and visited two schools and a support center. At a coconut and kakaoa (cocoa) plantation we learned how to roast and pound the kakaoa the old way. We visited a Samoan fale (home) and learned how Samoans prepare and cook their food in a traditional way. In the evening we enjoyed a cultural evening, the Samoan Siva Night.

Our visits took us to The Samoa Victim Support Development Center for children who have suffered sexual abuse, St. Mary Primary School for Girls, and the Marist Primary School for Boys.

At the Samoa Victim Support Development Center, it was a very emotional time listening to some of the children's stories. Many tears were shed when the children sang and danced to Amazing Grace, I'm Alive, and other songs. Afterwards we were invited to mingle with the children. Back on our bus, I asked everyone to spend a minute in silence to reflect back on our experience and the sad stories we had heard from the children. Mothers wiped tears from their eyes, as all sat in silence.

At St. Mary Primary School for Girls and the Marist Primary School for Boys we shared cultures, and dances, and visited the classrooms. It was a very good experience for both our pupils and theirs. We brought

sports gear and other donations. The highlight of this visit was to see the faces of students, staff and parents when they received their new rugby uniforms as rugby is the favorite sport in the islands.

This journey has brought joy. We received the call, we reached out and we shared. I felt that the being part of this *malaga* (mission) trip to Samoa was fulfilling our Provincial Chapter proposal which states "Finding ways of reaching out to remote mission communities...." (Chapter Proposals, New Evangelization, The Provincial Chapter Encourages. #2)

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# Cluny Sisters in the South Pacific Respond to the Measles Crisis in Samoa

amoa declared a state of emergency on November 25, closing all its schools, banning children from public gatherings, and mandating that everybody get vaccinated. Teams of people have been travelling the country administering thousands of vaccines.

Sister Lusini Falemaka, a nurse from our community in Mangere, joined one of the 23 medical teams that New Zealand sent to respond to the crisis. On her team there were three nurses, three administrators, an aide, a driver and a policeman.

Briefings were held at the Apia Hospital. The parish hall of Vailele village served as a base in the morning. In the afternoons the team made house calls in Letogo and Laulii.

Sister Lusini wrote, "My team vaccinated 330 persons yesterday. We see more than 300 in a day. The police are present for the villages that have no matai (chief). . . . After the morning round of vaccinations, we were sent on house calls. Every home in the village was visited."

The world lost a beautiful soul when my mom passed away at the age of 76. She was diagnosed with MS over 40 years ago, and within five years, was unable to move from the neck down. She had four young children, my dad traveled a lot for business, and yet she always made sure we all had a life full of choices and opportunities, and were never limited by her condition.

She faced every challenge with grace and dignity. She never complained about her MS, but always demonstrated an enormous amount of compassion and empathy for others. Her internal strength came from her faith, and the love of so many.

I asked for her forgiveness; I know it was granted, not only because that's what moms do, but also because she had a huge heart and always forgave us all.

Despite wishing for even one more day with her, we knew she was ready to go, her time had come, and she's at peace. I miss her so much, and continue to figure
