s we tentatively emerge from the sorrows and difficulties of a global pandemic and discover ourselves amid a world in turmoil and anguish, the topic of mental health and well-being is timely for us all.

A better understanding of mental illness and addictions in the context of our faith helps to equip us with insight and prepares individuals and communities to reach out with compassion and care to those among us who may be struggling with mental health issues.

Earlier this year, we became aware of an educational resource entitled The Sanctuary Course for Catholics, a series of seven 30-minute videos designed to raise awareness and begin conversations about mental health and mental illness within our parishes. As long-time spiritual care

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his edition of Cluny Connections is, in a sense, all about new beginnings. Our Canadian Associates introduce their ministry advocating for the mentally ill.

We remember Sister Bernadette as she entered into new life last September. Cluny Sisters in French Polynesia came together for their annual retreat, a time to begin again, renewing the vows we seek to live each day. Then they stayed on in assembly to look back, evaluate, and discern God's call into the future.

Who is Jesus the Christ for you? Perhaps you're invited to a new beginning: to spend time with the Gospel of Mark as it unfolds in the liturgy, meeting the "Son, the Beloved". If you feel so inclined, we offer some resources on Page 3. Whatever you decide, may you have a deepening sense of the Beloved at your side each day of the unfolding year.

# Sister Bernadette of Mary Immaculate Queen Lapre

n Monday, September 25, Sister Bernadette Lapre gently and quietly went home to God at St. Clare Home in Newport, RI. She is survived by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny, her sister Auora Lajoie, and her brother Normand Lapre, and numerous nieces, nephews, grand nieces and nephews from different parts of the United States.

Marie Bernadette Elmire was born to Wilfred A. Lapre and Marie Nerea Trahen Lapre in Fall River on March 9, 1933. She was one of 16 children. Sister Bernadette loved her family often told stories about each one. Her family found support in their loving sister and aunt. Upon entering the Sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny, August 15, 1962, she became Sister Bernadette of Mary Immaculate Queen. Sister Bernadette served in Rhode Island and in France.

There were two big events in Sister Bernadette's life of which she was very proud. She left school to help support her family but persisted in her efforts to earn her High School Diploma. The other big event was traveling to Washington, DC to testify before the House Appropriations Sub-Committee on behalf of medical coverage for elderly patients suffering from mental illness. As she told and re-told the stories, it was hard to tell which she considered her greatest achievement.

She had many friends from different walks of life because of her outgoing and generous nature. She

never ceased to pray for each of those who were in her life. Her consistent gift for her Sisters, family, friends and all those in need was her deep and sincere prayer. Often as she said a Rosary, she would mention the intended person by name. She will be deeply missed, by her Cluny Sisters, family, friends and the "other family "of St. Clare Home. The staff of St. Clare cared for Sister Bernadette with affection and understanding. We are all deeply grateful.

Sister Bernadette was a big part of our lives in the communities where she served, as well as later when she resided at St. Clare Home. She is fondly remembered by the sisters who knew her in France, and we here in the States all miss her very much.

## Celebrating 60 Years at Anne Marie Javouhey School – Raiatea The School that owes its foundation to persistent parents and a strike!

Cluny Sisters first arrived on the island of Raiatea (a 45 minute flight from Papeete, Tahiti) almost 100 years ago. They founded an elementary school that was greatly appreciated by Catholics and Protestants alike. Sixty years ago as Sister Noëlla, who was there at the time, tells the story, the parents begged the sisters to expand to a middle and high school. The sisters' petition to the Ministry of Catholic Schools French Polynesia was turned down. The parents were disappointed, but persisted. Word began to spread across the islands. Then it happened: the

very first strike in Polynesia! 100% of all the Catholic school employees called a strike. The ministry ceded, and Anne Marie Javouhey School was founded. Today the school thrives with the support of both Catholic and Protestant parents.

Celebrations began with Mass, followed by the blessing of the classrooms, and a lunch. Entertainment, provided by students and staff, included traditional music and dance and a beautiful tribute to Blessed Anne Marie Javouhey by a high school student.

volunteers in our regional psychiatric facility, Cluny Associates Mary Jean Marcuzzi and Therese Wallace prepared and submitted a proposal to the Hamilton Diocese to leverage our volunteer experience with a pilot presentation of the Sanctuary Course for Catholics locally at Saints Peter and Paul Parish.

In September 2023, over a 4-week period, we facilitated the Sanctuary Course for Catholics following Sunday morning Mass with the support and hospitality of parish volunteers. Topics included mental health and mental illness, stigma, recovery, companionship, self-care, and community. Each session included screening of two short films that featured the stories of Catholics living with mental health challenges, along with the insights of archbishops, theologians, and psychologists. Following each video, we talked about the theme presented, listened to personal stories, and answered many questions. Information about local area mental health clinics and supports were made available too. It was extremely well-received by the group of 25 people who attended the program. The program itself was rich in content and adaptable to the needs of the group. Hopefully other parishes within the diocese may consider offering this course, a blessing to individuals and families who have been suffering silently.

While the topic of mental illness has long been a taboo subject, it has become especially important and urgent in Canada to raise awareness about mental health and mental illness. The Government of Canada is adding to existing legislation, mental illness as a sole condition to qualify and obtain Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD), also known as euthanasia [in effect on March 17, 2024]. Most recently, discussions are underway about including drug addiction as a qualifier for euthanasia and allowing so-called mature minors (age 14 to 17 years) to choose assisted suicide. Ominously, Canadians are staring down the path of death-ondemand, the path running parallel to the reality of abortion-on-demand in this country. This insidious legislation is a clear and present danger to the lives of our most vulnerable brothers and sisters and is sad testimony to the loss of a sense of sanctity of life in the secular society of Canada.
