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Javouhey House, Newport Retreat Participants Share Their Experiences

30-Day At-Home Retreat, A New Adaptation of the Ignatian Exercises

Saint Ignatius created a retreat for those who could live in a retreat house for a month. He also adapted it for those who would make the retreat "in daily life" over a period of months. Mark Thibideaux, SJ has provided a retreat "in daily life" designed as a 30-day at-home experience. Participants meet with a retreat guide to prepare for the retreat and then once a week during the retreat. Twice daily, they spend time in prayer on the Gospels, using Father Thibideaux's guide.

Jamie Moore and Kathleen Batchelor opted for making this retreat last January. They not only enjoyed their personal prayer times, but they also looked forward to the weekly meetings for prayer and guidance. Here are some of their reflections on the experience.

Kathleen Murphy Batchelor wrote:

Completing the 30-day At-Home Retreat opened my eyes to the beautiful truth and power of God's love for me and for the world. I have found so many opportunities for growth in both my silent and active prayer life here in community at Javouhey House, and look forward with joyful anticipation to whatever Sister Marie offers next.

Jamie Moore shared the following:

I am a believer that everything happens for a reason.

Sr. Marie Cooper offered the 30-Day At-Home Retreat at the perfect time for me to embark on a journey spending more time in thought-filled meditation and inward reflection.

Although a Catholic from birth including years of Catholic education, these past months have been more influential on my prayer life than my prior decades of worship. Possibly I am starting to realize my age–and my vulnerability–and appreciate that I want to converse with God on a regular basis.

Farming Projects



Update on Efforts to Raise Awareness about Mental Health Issues

The response to our initial presentation of the Sanctuary Course for Catholics in September 2023 has been met with some interest in a couple of the parishes within the Diocese of Hamilton. The course offering itself is rich in content that may be presented in a variety of ways. As such, one parish has established a study group, using the facilitator and participants handbooks available as supporting materials, to guide their conversation about mental health and mental illness. Hopefully over time general reluctance to discuss this issue will be overcome by the sheer need to address the elephant in the room!

A tentative victory in our battle against euthanasia for the mentally ill was realized earlier this month when a moratorium was announced on the proposed legislation to expand Canada's existing legislation known as MAiD (Medical Assistance in Dying) until 2027. The temporary suspension came about largely due to the outcry from medical professionals protesting their unpreparedness for such a plan.

Andrew and Therese co-led the 2024 Ash Wednesday prayer service and distribution of ashes for patients in the Spiritual Center, followed by visits to patients on all clinical units with ashes.

Anecdotes about people seeking euthanasia for reasons of poverty, homelessness, lack of healthcare and social supports speak of the anguish and hopelessness prevalent in our communities and reflect poorly on our societal response to suffering. Masquerading as compassion and a human right, Medical Assistance in Dying remains a sinister threat to the most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters, but we celebrate the reprieve and give thanks to God. God bless you for your prayers!
